



iPhone G3 Water Submersion Recovery Attempt

I have had the G3 16GB iPhone since July 2008 and never got it wet once. I figured the fee I paid to AT&T also included the AppleCare (\$70 USD) for the device. I was wrong.

Well, guess what? If you get the iPhone wet, it voids the warranty. Did you know that? I didn't either.

It was in my pants pocket when it went in the wash. It barely got wet, but with a full battery charge it did not function. Zip, Zero, Nada. So like a good boy, I took it in to the place where I had bought it. They said to call Apple. We did. The person



at the other end said; "Look in the earplug hole. Is the end pink? I looked. It was not. So he asked if it was registered under Apple Care. Dumb me. I found out I had not purchased it. AT&T does not include that when you buy from their store. It has to be obtained separately directly from Apple. So we got that done. A day later I swapped phones, figuring I was in the clear. After all, the wet sensor did not show it got wet.

I got it back 3 days later with a cursory form letter, saying they had found that the unit was not covered by the warranty. I ended up paying \$500, plus shipping, plus AppleCare. No AT&T price. No discount. FULL PRICE! This is not the right direction to go to get out of debt, folks!

This is the first time I ever got shafted by Apple. Royally shafted. I found I was not the only one. So I will relate my experience with you, so you do not possibly get shafted too.

I see other folks getting into the hot tube at the Racket Club pulling their cellphones from their swimsuits and chatting merrily away after being in the water. No problem! Don't even get *near* the water with an iPhone.

The iPhone, on the other hand is an aquaphobe. I can see this being a real issue for folks in high humidity areas or for those who perspire a lot. Why is the iPhone G3 so darned sensitive? I figured it was hermetically sealed. After all, it has no places where water can get into it, right? Wrong! Besides the earplug hole, there are the ring switch, the volume control, the 2 speaker holes, the microphone hole, the on/off switch and the charge cable hole. Any of which could be used to possibly short out the iPhone.

When I got the old iPhone back, it still did not work. So I went online to see if there was anything I could do about it. Bury it in silica beads or dry rice and let it sit for a week and try again. I did that. No such luck. By the way, the wet sensor is still silver.

Check to see if your insurance covers cellphone damage. I have a \$500 deductible, so I'm screwed. We are an Apple affiliate at macCompanion.com and we *still* got screwed!

Be honest with Apple and still pay full price. After reading that, I read they might repair or replace, if the iPhone gets run over... just sayin', folks.

Since I got the iPhone back, and it is now out of warranty, totally dead, I figured I had a shot at taking it apart and seeing if it was damaged beyond repair. The rice treatment didn't make a bit of difference.

I followed the steps – or tried to. Guess what? The touchscreen really does come off the iPhone. I spent a day trying to remove the bezel. Don't do that. The screen does come out, so you can do the other steps. I was wondering why it was so hard to take apart. The bezel by the way, is glued and screwed, so you cannot separate the metal bezel from the case (I tried). I've got the unit dismantled. I may never, ever get it back together completely. At least not by the time I get this published. The screws are so small and thing have to be just so.

The battery is totally, completely dead. There is no water damage.

The wet sensor tape is ½ pink on the back side. I did not take it out to test it to see if the pink "shows through" if it gets wet.

Follow-up on Health Hazards of Compact Fluorescent Lamps

The "Downsides" page on PESWiki I linked to last month in *macCompanion* was largely updated and revamped, based on my own and my family's experiences with CFLs. If you remember, we replaced a lot of incandescents because we wanted to reduce our energy bill. We started

Software Development Jobs in a Down Economy, Part I

The economy is down.

That's how I began last month's article, and the economy hasn't improved much since. With job reductions being announced nearly everyday, it seemed timely to address some matter to help make software developers as recession-proof as possible. In this two part series, I will discuss the environment we are dealing with and offer some tips for those looking for work now.

In particular, being a Macintosh-focused column, I wish to address benefits specific to OS X developers. For example, consider Apple's record profit and revenue announced for Q1 2009 [http://www.macworld.com/article/138362/2009/01/earnings.html]. Note that I did not say that they were merely profitably, or that they beat last year (which would be extraordinary just by itself in this economy). No, these are **record-breaking** profits and revenues for them. Better than anytime before. Better than the heady 1990's prior to the dot-com bust. Better than in the golden days of the near Apple II monopoly.

Best ever.

In this economy.

I don't think a "wow" is out of order here. Pretty amazing. During this same period, income for other usually profitable companies took nose dives, including Microsoft's 11% loss, and Google's unbelievable 68% drop (each now planning significant employee reductions). But not Apple.

(At least not so far.) For this reason, software programmers who hook their wagons to Apple's ship are going to find themselves is a relatively better position.

Comparison to '92/'93

The current national unemployment rate is (as I write this) 7.6%, the worst since 1992. Of course if you listen to the doom-sayers, we are supposedly in the worst recession since the Great Depression. Well, this seems to me an absurd statement. Although things expect get worse before they get better, they have to get dramatically worse before such sensationalistic reports become anything but yellow journalism. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics [http://www.bls.gov/], the 1992/1993 recession's jobless rate peaked at 7.8% (June 1992), higher than where we are now (pre-stimulus package). And although the unemployment may grow even higher before it's over, any assumptions of that kind are speculation. So I remain skeptical of the doom and gloom this early in advance, particularly due to the political motivations that are involved (from both Democrats and Republicans).

Sub-8% recessions are not uncommon through much of our history. The Bureau's web site data goes back only as far as 1948, but in just that time we have had four such recessions in which unemployment exceeded 7% but whose peak never hit 8%. Only twice in the past 60 years has a recession occurred with a greater than 8% unemployment rate: the '75/76 recession (which peaked at 9.0%), and the '82/83 recession peaking at a whopping 10.8%. Thus, comparisons with 1992 seems more appropriate for the current recession (at this juncture anyway).

Having acknowledged all this though, the recession in the 90's is substantially different for you readers in one important way: software developers were not affected by it. Fifteen years ago the need for programmers remained at an all-time high, and there was effectively no recession for them. I can speak to this personally, as I was interviewing during this period and found I had my pickings of offers from which to choose. Similarities between then and now exist for auto manufacturers, skilled and unskilled labor, and other such groups. However, tech jobs remained secure then, since the economic pressure at the time came from Mexico and Japan. Today, it is from China and India, and software people are now feeling the pinch.

"But I already have a job, so I'm not worried."

I wonder how many people who expressed this sentiment ended up out of work a year later. And even if your job is truly safe, there are side-effects to a down economy that make it in your best interest to remain marketable. One casualty of bad economic times is the reduction, if not elimination, of raises. When corporate money gets tight, raises go out only to those mission critical people that the company can't afford to lose. And if you are not one of these people, your income gets stifled. Worse, you risk the prospect of losing your job to such a person.

Fortunately (as mentioned earlier), being a Macintosh developer already puts you in a better category. Typically, Mac developers are hired only by those businesses that deliver product to Mac users. As long as your business is not phasing out its Macintosh offerings, it is going to continue to need at least some Mac developers. If that is the case, then your job is vulnerable only on these two counts:

- 1. Cutting back the number, but not the elimination of, Mac developers
- 2. Corporate decisions to out-source to China or elsewhere

In the case of #1, it's a matter of maintaining your knowledge and abilities, so that you are not one of the poor performers that get axed first. In the case of #2, sadly there is little you can do, other than hope that your management is smart enough to investigate and learn of the horror stories of others who have done this. (That they haven't outsourced you by now is a good sign that they may never at all.)

With Apple doing as well as it is, even in a recession like this, it speaks very loudly to businesses producing software, peripherals or accessories being sold to that market. And to be able to deliver something that sells well to a Mac user, an off-shored "lowest common denominator" solution will not do. With the Macintosh user base growing (and the Windows base declining), Mac skills will become relatively more greatly valued. Furthermore, as the Macintosh growth being so much more recent, the Mac developer base has not had the opportunity to grow in the same proportion so quickly. This means that the ratio of developers to users is much more favorable to you the Mac developer, than to Windows developers. All in all, this means that being a software developer for the Macintosh is (relatively) more advantageous, than being one for Microsoft Windows or Unix.

Macintosh Development Changes

Also having changed since 1992 is the know-how to perform the job. Back then, System 7 was about a year old, and Windows 3.1 was just released. Mac developers were combing through Inside Macintosh Volume VI to keep up with the latest changes, whilst old DOS users were just beginning to realize that this whole Windows thing wasn't going to go away anytime soon. For Mac programmers, System 7 changes were built upon a foundation of already learned material, 90% of which still remained relevant. It was merely a matter of keeping up with new information, rather than relearning.

Today, it is very different. Nothing that I had to know to do my job then is necessary or even relevant now. To be in a good position to be hired as a Mac developer today, you need to know Objective-C and the Cocoa API, which has no overlap whatsoever with the old System 7 Toolbox. Although it is true that there are still houses maintaining Carbon/C++ code, and there needs to be developers with experience in this, there are a plethora of Mac developers who can do this already. Almost all the Carbon/C++ positions are already filled, and with time are being eliminated in favor of Cocoa/Objective-C. A similar situation exists on the Windows side: MFC/C++ developers are a dime a dozen and can be found anywhere.

If you want a shot at Windows development in the future, you need to learn .NET development with C# (although VB.NET is also a growing potential). Otherwise you end up being like the lone COBOL or PL/I programmer in an IT department: they keep you around only for only as long as it's cheaper to do so, than to bite the bullet and rewrite the mission critical code in C++.

Then there's Java. 15 years ago, the computer section of any bookstore was deluged with books on Java. With respect to programming languages, it was clearly the favorite son of the mid- to late-1990's. And today it still enjoys some popularity among Unix programmers, and various niches in the Windows and Mac development arenas. But on balance, both Apple and Microsoft are urging their developers to drop Java in favor of Cocoa and .NET, respectively.

As painful as this is to say (being a C++ bigot myself), Mac developers wishing to remain in the game should focus exclusively on Cocoa development with Objective-C/C++. No, Carbon/C++ is not dead, and in fact it probably still commands a greater share of the Mac development market. However, these are not jobs that are going to be waiting around for you. The best of the best Mac C++ gurus will continue to slurp up whatever remaining Carbon work there is to be had. Unlike Carbon, the need for Cocoa development continues to outstrip the supply of capable developers. I still continually receive messages from headhunters in desperate search for Cocoa programmers to write Mac and/or iPhone apps. This is the future of the Mac.

A Real Solution To The False System Of Debt

We are on the brink of a worldwide economic depression, the likes of which may make the 1930's look like a recession, and in such a possibility it would be wise to prepare ahead of time by saving money in Gold and Silver, by storing storable foods, safety supplies and perhaps even coming off the dependency on the "grid". 

The Many Macintosh Ways to Quit

There are several ways to quit Mac programs. Some of them are not obvious, especially if you're accustomed to using Windows.

• Menus and Shortcuts

Nearly every Mac program offers a Quit command under its application menu — for instance, Safari > Quit Safari. (Some background-only programs and certain Java applications don't.) From the keyboard, Command/Q is a near-universal shortcut for quitting. If the program demands attention before it can quit (for example, the document contains unsaved changes), it will first ask if you're sure you want to quit.

• Closing Versus Quitting


If you're switching from a PC, you may be used to quitting programs by clicking on a window's close box; the Mac equivalent is the small red dot in the upper left corner of the window. But on a Mac, closing all open windows usually won't quit that program — OS X applications can continue to run even if there aren't any open windows. There are exceptions: usually, if the program can have only one window open at a time (as is the case with System Preferences, Dictionary, and Calculator), closing it will quit the program. But there are exceptions to the exceptions: Address Book and iCal continue to run even if you close their single windows.

• Emergency Quitting

If nothing happens when you try to quit a program, you can force-quit it: switch to a program that's still responsive, and press Command/Option/Escape. This brings up the Force Quit dialog box. Select the stuck program on the list, and then click on *Force Quit*. You can also force-quit programs via the Dock. Click and hold on the problem program's Dock icon to bring up its menu. Assuming that the system knows the program is stuck, you should see a Force Quit option at the bottom.

• One other avenue for force quitting is to launch the *Activity Monitor* (found in the /Applications/Utilities folder) select a program, and click on "Quit Process," then "Force Ouit."



AppleCare: You Can't Afford to be Without It

AppleCare is an extended warranty and more. Is it a good deal? Should you buy AppleCare with your new or refurbished Macintosh computer or Apple iPod? We are asked these questions all the time. Let me state from the start that I generally have a negative impression of extended warranty plans and get



annoyed when I am buying something at a retailer and am pressured to buy some extended service plan. I think that in most cases, they are just a waste of money. Consumer Reports generally agrees with Don about the waste of many for most commercial extended warranties — but doc sez, there are exceptions.

I want to make the case, though, that AppleCare is very different and is an excellent value that you should consider for your Mac. In fact, one noted consumer publication called AppleCare "the only extended warranty worth considering."

There are two basic benefits of AppleCare.

Hardware Warranty — The hardware portion of the AppleCare Protection Plan extends the one-year warranty on your new or factory-refurbished Mac from one year to three years. It adds two additional years of coverage. For the iPod AppleCare adds one year.

This ensures that you will have access to genuine Apple repair parts and qualified Apple service technicians, should your Mac require service. You will be able to take your Mac to any Apple-authorized service center or send your Mac to Apple directly for depot service. Both parts and labor are covered for the three years.

The plan is comprehensive and includes the whole system: mouse, keyboard, AirPort Card and Base Station, and up to two Apple displays with your Mac Pro.

To qualify for AppleCare, you have to still be within the one-year Apple warranty period on your new or factory-refurbished Mac. Veronica here at Small Dog Electronics sends an AppleCare reminder letter to each of our customers just before their warranties expire.

The Apple display is covered only if it is purchased at the same time and same location as the Mac that you are using, there is also a separate AppleCare Protection Plan now for Apple displays.

The AppleCare Protection plan is valid in both the USA and Canada.



Protecting Your Online Reputation — A Real Serious Issue Social Networkers and would-be employees.

You have a good reputation around town, but how does your online reputation stack up? Your online reputation includes the content returned when your name or email address is queried in Google, Yahoo, or the new people-search websites such as Spock http://www.spock.com/. This content includes news, personal web sites, participation in blogs, forums, and social media sites, even photos and videos. The Internet has become the place where second and even first impressions are very often made.

According to Search Engine Watch, there are 25 to 50 million proper-name searches performed each day. Beyond curiosity, people "Google" other people to verify credentials,



assess reputation, and to look for a method of contact. A 2007 survey showed that 50% of hiring officials use the Internet to vet job applications.

Doc Notes: It's also a means that the folks who process security clearances, can checked out— on the cheep. The method is less costly than door-to-door interviews with neighbors, co-workers and acquaintances.

This {web searching method} has both strong positive and negative implications. Websites such rhttp://www.ratemyteachers.com and http://rottenneighbor.com make it easy for anonymous individuals to post malicious personal attacks on the Internet. More common are examples of jobs lost, promotions denied, and job offers never made due to information that individuals posted about themselves on sites such as FaceBook or MySpace.

And perhaps, the most common are cases of embarrassing mistaken identity — when a stranger who happens to share your name posts information you'd prefer not to be associated with.

There is already plenty of information posted about us online, whether we want it there or not. The important thing is to make sure this information reflects positively on our name, work, and character. Fortunately, with a little effort, we can influence what people find when they search for us. Here are seven steps you can take to establish, protect and enhance your virtual reputation.

Use Common Sense — Information posted online is often available for many years, especially to determined seekers. The easiest way to protect your virtual reputation is to avoid posting seemingly-fun-but-potentially-embarrassing information about yourself, especially on social network sites, in public forums, and under your own name. Even college students are learning not to write about their hangovers and hookups online.

If you are writing about a controversial subject, it's often best to post anonymously (when possible). Otherwise use a pseudonym and try to post in private, password protected forums. Still, be cautious. Pseudonyms can be deciphered, and just because information is originally posted in a private forum doesn't mean it will stay there. Remember, especially online, you only get one reputation.

Set up a LinkedIn Profile — http://linkedin.com is a very easy, positive, and free way to summarize professional accomplishments, connect with colleagues and partners, and promote your self-online. It is fast becoming an essential resource for hiring and HR departments. LinkedIn is Google-friendly, so your LinkedIn profile will show up via a Google search. People-search programs like Spock.com rely on LinkedIn. Also, on LinkedIn you are in strict control of your profile, and only connect to trusted contacts.

Set up a Personal Website or Three — Buy an Internet domain in your name (such as http://www.edwardshepard.com), or as close to your name as possible — There are malicious individuals who have purchased domains in other people's names, solely to post derogatory and false information about them. While this could happen to anyone, people who work in public service are especially vulnerable. Ed Shepard says I own 'edwardshepard.com, edwardshepard.net, and edwardshepard.org'. It costs me less than \$20 to own all three for two years, and I can easily renew for up to five years at a time. This prevents someone else from making a website that makes me look bad, either on purpose or accidentally. I can make myself look bad enough, thank you very much.

There are many good websites where you can purchase a domain in your name. Many offer web hosting on top of domain registration. Popular registrars include godaddy.com, google.com, and (most expensive) networksolutions.com. I use intuitiveisp.com because a friend founded the company. A personal website is one of the most powerful tools for protecting your online reputation

Establish at least a basic website with information about yourself, preferably at the domain you purchased above. Many domain registrars include free, basic webpage hosting services. Alternately, many web hosts offer free domain registration.

Your website can be very simple, with your name, some basic information about you, a public email address, and a link to your LinkedIn profile. Your website is also a good place to showcase your special interests and expertise. Don't be afraid to have fun with your website, as long as it's tasteful and ultimately reflects well on you.

Also, most modern website creation packages include the ability to password-protect certain pages, where you can post private information for select friends and family. Even if you don't want to buy a domain, there are some great, easy-to-use free blog and website hosting companies. My favorites are Blogger.com, Google Pages, Tumblr.com, and Weebly.com. These typically provide an URL that includes your name, such as "www.edwardshepard.tumblr.com." I will cover these and other free, high quality website creation tools in a future article.

If You Use Social Networking Sites (FaceBook, MySpace, etc), Be Sure to Polish Your Profile — Most online social networks give you a fair amount of control over what information is shared in your profile. For many professionals, less is more. Simply posting your name and profession is often best. Addresses, phone numbers, and birth dates are best kept private (especially as these can be tools for identity thieves).

Use Google Alerts — You can receive an automatic email (for free) from Google anytime Google discovers a new webpage with your name. This is very easy to set up, and you can control

how many times a day, week or month you receive the alert. You can also do this for your school or business.

Of course, if your name happens to be "Brad Pitt" or "Brit Spears," you will get lots of bogus alerts. On the other hand, this can be an easy way to find out if people online are talking about you.

Consider Third-Party Reputation Management Solutions — Companies such as Naymez.com (free) can help you positively nurture your virtual reputation. Wink.com (free) shows your online profile, and can help you to dispute it. Reputationdefender.com (fee-based) not only shows you what's being said about you, but also actually provides tools for you to get rid of the content you don't like.

We must consider that our virtual reputation is as important as our real-world reputation. Fortunately, with just a little effort, we can gain enhanced professional and networking capabilities when we do this.

The Northern Spy
Thanatology--Alive and Well

Reading O. Henry the other night reminded the Spy once again how literary standards have changed since the turn of the previous century. O. Henry's fabulous short stories are filled with Biblical and other literary references, and employ a wide-ranging vocabulary that would be opaque to most readers under fifty today. Moreover, the denizens of these yarns--cowboys, shopgirls, indigents, petty miscreants, and members of the constabulary, were also his readers. A writer of his day could confidently address *hoi polloi* who nonetheless could be counted upon to be peripatetically literate.

Today's reading audience, such as it is, has a passing acquaintance with a plethora of technical terms and social buzzwords picked up in chat rooms and over other Internet virtual back fences, but these are for the most part pedestrian nouns and verbs, lacking the descriptive eloquence of a bygone literate era.

Today, a writer must use grade nine prose to have a hope of being read. Consider magazines. The glossy big-picture rags prosper, while erudite and more technical pubs such as the long-lasting but now late and lamented Dr. Dobbs perish unread, because there is are few left who can effectively read them. iSteve apparently agrees, reportedly declining to make an eBook reader because no one reads any more. The Spy adds that if they read it is for the vacuous escape of fantasy (science fiction seems dead too) or romance, not to have the mind engaged or the horizons expanded. Solomon may have been right that of the making of books there is no end, but of what quality, and to what end?

One could also argue that the paper publishing industry has priced itself out of business anyway, that eBooks are the future, and dead tree format is, well, deceased and overdue for burial. The Spy happens to agree with this assessment, but its import in the argument at hand is tangential.

There's far more to this phenomenon than the lack of, say, Biblical literacy, even the near exorcism from what passes as modern social intercourse (including in the neo-religious subculture) of its concepts--creation, stewardship, sin, sacrifice, propitiation, redemption, justification, righteousness, resurrection, service, faith, hope, love, and even the asking of questions about the very purpose of it all. There's also more here than a mere secular attenuation of vocabulary and concomitantly of thought processing capability.

Post-moderns have become fixated on the moment, the two-second sound byte, the all-but-subliminal ad, the ephemeral emotional high (perhaps drug-induced). It's about the graphic not the text, the virtual not the real, the phrase not the paragraph, the experience not the underlying reality, the emotional buzz not the logos, the second not the year. Forget analysis, depth, content, commitment and profundity. Speed, size, visuals, and the moment matter. Substance is so yesterday.

How else to explain what advertisers know too well--steak doesn't sell, sizzle does. How else but logic-defying emotion to explain the marketplace attachment to a buggy and inherently inferior computer operating system? How else to explain the irrational behaviour that creates stock market and housing bubbles in defiance of reasonable analysis? How else to elucidate the apparent belief of supposed experts that money or information can spontaneously appear *ex nihlio*? That bad systems can be made better by computerizing them so they run faster? That governments throwing money at problems caused by greed will magically generate fiscally sound solutions? That continuing to trust in doing things the same way will eventually result in different outcomes? Why, when people know that alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs tax their intelligence, and gambling taxes their stupidity, do they continue to burn incense to both? What, me thimk? I kin bearly spel.

The universities are not helping. Driven by issues of cost, resource shortages, and student demands to hand over the piece of paper ever faster, many have gone to three year discipline-intense baccalaureate programs, moving away from the Liberal Arts as an effective means to begin the process of producing literate and educated citizens.

As a best case this is a mere pendulum swing overdue for a negative derivative. As a worst, the Fourth Civilization may founder on its citizens' inability to read, to argue, to understand, to think, to engage in more than the trivial and mundane reaction to the emotional moment. Make no mistake. Where literacy perishes, where informed conversation and debate on foundations fails, democracy inevitably yields to dictatorship of the ignorant by the ignorant. Too sweeping a big picture? Consider the small.

A case in point and one that might be of more interest to the less philosophically inclined among the Spy's many readers, is the recent and rapid demise of computing science as an academic discipline. In most jurisdictions, CS enrollment reached a peak between 2002 and 2004, but has declined from there by fifty to ninety percent since. Universities that once had robust programs are down to a comparative handful of students, and the smaller institutions are either quietly closing their departments or transitioning resources to a less demanding or technical informatics entity. Tough economic times are ensuring that such departments will not survive to catch a next wave, should there be one.

One might ask whether anyone should care? Disciplines come and go. Does it matter? One might reply first and generally per the above that when academic discipline itself goes, society is in serious trouble. Second, one might answer specifically that technology companies relying on a steady stream of highly trained graduates had better care, because the supply is quickly becoming Elijah's Kerith Ravine, or Jonah's vine, with no rainmaker on the horizon. Who's going to write their code? Not script kiddies.

Again, it is important to discern whether this is a cyclical change or a paradigm shift. Most who declaim on the subject rely on the former explanation, supposing that when dot-com and other business busts are forgotten, the business cycle reverses, and companies again need trained graduates and offer bonuses to get them, supply and demand corrections will shepherd a flock of high school students back into the fold.

The Spy offers a tentative and half-hearted "maybe" to the Pollyanna hypothesis. It seems as likely to him that the cultural and social factors described above have permanently damaged the learning environment for the mathematical and technical education necessary to build a computer scientist from a neophyte. Even given the will and resources to do so, and neither are obviously in abundance, the supply might take as much as an entire twelve-year student generation to re-establish. It may never be. Some taps become frozen once turned off.

Indeed it seems to him that public schools are now so focused on creating the illusion of acceptance, social success, relevance and tolerance (whatever those slogans mean this week), and universal good feelings, that the mandate to teach content, whether in language, literature, mathematics, science, or elsewhere, has been intentionally deprecated, if not altogether obfuscated. The cause de jour is elevated to the pedestal, while curriculum substance is sacrificed before it on the altar of social theory, without educators seeming to comprehend the irony that they thereby undermine the very society that created them the platform upon which they work toward its destruction.

From a students' point of view, why work for knowledge and understanding when minimal skills suffice for the nonce? For instance, a beginner can take a six month course in web design and score a job with a half decent income. Why spend four years getting a degree that has to include such subjects as philosophy, English literature, chemistry, communications, psychology, and business, when the starting wage isn't much better and you still have to train on the job?

Easy one to answer if anyone's listening. The pure web designer is a one-trick pony who will be out of work in a half decade when other skills become more demanded. On the other hand, the properly trained computing scientist is a software engineer, a multi-skilled communicator conversant with many disciplines and tools, a versatile problem solver writing code that matters, and who will always have a job (whatever the title), perhaps in part supervising the temporary IT boys and girls who do the grunge work that requires little understanding or intentionality.

But long-term effort for postponed big-time career gratification isn't part of the twenty-first century lexicon any more than is, say, sanctification. Minimal effort and skills leading to immediate disposable income is, and today's attention spans don't go beyond the moment, the long term past month's end payday. Our society is not only becoming illiterate in its own history, language, literature, ethics, religion, and philosophy, but in mathematics and science as well (and is proud of the latter).

Doing Algebra homework in grade nine takes longer than a commercial. That automatically makes it both uncool and too hard. Why not play another video game, twitter some friends, or hang out on Facebook instead? Programming is labour intensive. Why not scarf a script or two and cobble up a hack that looks impressive, even if the code is neither human readable or understandable? Have you seen my new skis and car stereo? Dig the eye candy on my arm. Playing with toys and people is the new cool. Studying mathematics, physics, chemistry, engineering, and computing is as passé as reading philosophy (or even O. Henry).

The new disdain for the "hard" subjects isn't universal, of course. In fact the Spy's current calculus class boasts more mental horsepower and work ethic than he's seen gathered in any one classroom for lo these four decades. But supposing this isn't a blip is wishful thinking. It's also a far smaller class than the one he taught the previous generation in the same room twenty-five years ago, and moreover is populated by pre-med students going for the impressive GPA, having only a peripheral interest in mathematical ideas and almost none in those of computing as a discipline. Hey, give these few Horatios credit for tackling a bridge that's long and hard, but who's going to fix or create the medical and other high-tech for these putative professionals to do their jobs effectively and efficiently?

Society's stereotypes don't help either, particularly the one that paints computing scientists as all men, dull and impoverished souls spending dreary days isolated in a cubicle slinging impenetrable code, but lacking a life. What nonsense the human mind can believe when it suits. Is there a myth more wrong? In real life, they spend most of their time working with users, designers, marketers, each other, testers, then users again. They write code people can read and modify, not just that a machine can scan. They know enough about many industries and disciplines to adapt broad skills to the task at hand, are widely read and consummate communicators. If material success goes on your A-list, they are high earners with many perks. They wheel with the movers and the shakers big time. And yes, they probably sweep Augeas' stables in their spare time. Hockey bunnies might be well advised to try fishing in the software engineering pool. If it matters, so would go-getter men looking for a partner wife, for the field has many successful women practitioners.

Can attitudes and perceptions be turned around and computing science be re-invented? Not without a social and educational sea change that includes a return to hard work as an incentive rather than a bore, reading as an engagement of ideas rather than an escape from them, mathematics as a thing of beauty rather than a chore, computing science as inherently cool and important rather than the domain of uninteresting geeks, and a new appreciation that significantly worthwhile things (temporal or eternal) are hard work and worth it.

This won't happen by itself. Moreover, government intervention, as with the economy, is more likely to make things worse than better. For self-preservation, industry needs to come to bat on its own behalf. Companies like Apple, MS, HP, IBM, and a score of other heavy hitters need to use their mindshare clout to get involved with universities, do ProD and exchanges with faculty, assist in designing relevant curriculum, fund chairs, scholarships, and facilities, co-market the discipline, and restore the cool from the top down. Re-invigorated liberal arts universities may then be able to help the same corporations influence the grade school curriculum sufficiently to maintain the new supply chain. The pitiful efforts of some notwithstanding, marketing is what industry must do to function at all, but career marketing is also what universities cannot effectively accomplish. Town and gown need to get together on this one. Survival is at stake. Marketshare is the likely outcome for the participants, so it's worthwhile.

However, if industry collectively deems it unimportant to intervene and seek to change high school students' minds about mathematics, technical and scientific subjects, and computing science in particular, the Spy's mother's motto seems *a propos:* "You kids'll be the death of me yet."

The health problems at MS may not yet be terminal, but certainly have the industry abuzz. Turns out that many in the latest round of MS layoffees were mistakenly given overly-large severance packages. At first they were asked to return the excess, but wind of a PR disaster caused a reversal, along with new cheques quietly mailed to those who were correspondingly underpaid. Troubles computing simple arithmetic leave people wondering if the company can get anything right. One presumes the calculations were done on a W*nd*ws machine. Shoulda used a Mac. But the discussion above provokes a more fundamental question. How are they going to get those people back (or ones like them) when the need turns around? Mind you, the Spy doesn't think he envies anyone working at MS today. On the whole, he'd rather be in Philadelphia.

In late breaking news (which the Spy doesn't do as news, per se) comes word of the discovery of a problem in the .xls (old Excel) file format, creating a vulnerability that permits an attack. But really. How many people load documents from unknown or untested sources, especially into MS programs? We've been down this road before.

By contrast, remember when your generic IT columnist hack could throw something into print by following her byline with "The beleaguered Apple Computer Corp...." then speculating on when the company would pass on to the great computing graveyard in the bit bucket? Some still seem to be hoping the malaise will spread to Cupertino (to validate their anti-Mac stance?), but so far, iSteve's little company is motoring along doing relatively better than anyone else, even in his absence. No death watch there, though its hard to imagine more than one of Palm, RIM, and Motorola surviving as its competitors, and Dell doesn't look very healthy just now either. Again, chalk up marketshare increases for Apple even during the recession, with much larger gains afterward, when we say *requiescat in pacem* to many of the others.

Book of the Month is "Guns Germs and Steel--The Fates of Human Societies" by Jared Diamond, 2003 edition from Norton.

To be sure this isn't a new work, having been first published in 1997. But when the Spy got it for Christmas, it was new to him. It was interesting to see in a Pulitzer winner similar thinking to that in his own book "The Fourth Civilization--Technology, Society, and Ethics", which had its genesis in the 1980s and early 1990s. The interplay and mutual feedback of available and adopted technology on the one hand, and the way a society develops over its history on the other is truly fascinating.

The Spy quibbles in a minor way with the awkward but apparently obligatory bows toward evolution, which add nothing to his argument. A major flaw is that GGS downplays the third lega-a society's beliefs, particularly concerning right and wrong. These do play a very significant role, and provide explanations where the author demurs or evades, for the historical and social differences between nations that apparently had essentially the same access to technology. Diamond dances around but doesn't explicitly acknowledge this issue with respect to China, then ignores it altogether when discussing other regions such as Northern Europe, where it also played a significant role in technology adoption and subsequent history. Still in all, an excellent read. Recommended.

Product of the month is once more Literature and Latte's Fabulous book writing software Scrivener. How many software authors would post on their forum a soul-searching piece apologizing for the necessity of charging for the next major update because it will be so large and represents so much work, only to have the customers all reply "that's OK, we understand. If fact, we underpaid in the first place."? More on this when those updates arrive, but the Spy is relying more on Scrivener for the really heavy writing lifting all the time. And, he is lifting once again, having written several new chapters in upcoming books for *The Interregnum* series. Wait for it.

Web 3.0

Web 3.0 refers to the third decade of the Web starting 2010 to 2020 and the technologies expected to "upgrade" the user experience. Some new upgrades include:

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Aaaah, removable media. Is it not the ultimate storage device? Fill up one unit, pop it out, and pop a new unit into the drive, then keep collecting more stuff. When I started computing in the early 1980s, 5.2" floppy diskettes were still in use. They were originally 360K in capacity and with some mutilation could go up to 720K. High-density version was available, too, with a whopping size of 1.2 MB!






Still the 5.25" floppy couldn't fight off the rising star of the time, the 3.5" diskette, with a top capacity size of 1.4 MB.

Soon 1.4 MB was not enough, and we saw the arrival of the Iomega Bernoulli and SyQuest cartridges. One regret I have about cleaning up my junk collection involves a 10 MB Bernoulli cartridge. It was the size of a college notebook! I threw it out when I moved years ago. I cannot remember the capacity of the Bernoulli media that was battling with the SyQuest. I know that SyQuest cartridges came in capacities of 44 MB, then 88 MB. Knowing that competing products usually outdo their competitor just slightly, I am sure it was probably somewhere around those numbers.

For my Wall Street PowerBook, I got an Imation SuperDisk with a capacity of 120 MB. Remember what I said about edging out the competition just a

little? The SuperDisk drive could also read 3.5 floppy disks, but again Imation was late to the booming removable hard drive scene and joined other companies as losers to Iomega.

Almost out of nowhere, Iomega upped the ante with the Zip drive, at 100 MB and in the 3.5" form factor, and just a bit thicker than a floppy disk. It was wildly successful and rang the death knell for SyQuest. SyQuest did try to keep up with a 135 MB 3.5" drive and media, but it was a case of being late to the market. And I do remember the click of death on the early drives that almost cost me delay. Files not \$\$\$ {Doc.} Anyone for a bunch of Zip 100, 250 disks media. I do have one or two Zip drives left, but no longer use them.

The problem with removable hard drives is that you need the drives to use them. You need some other physical device that has to be hooked up to the computer in order to use the cartridge. I used to have to carry an Iomega USB drive back and forth between the office and home. Sometimes I would remember to bring everything; other times I would forget the power cable for the drive, or the USB cable for the device. Too much hassle!

Nowadays, the de facto removable media is the USB Flash drive. About the size of the human thumb, you usually just plug them in and start using them. No need for any extra cables. Over the years, I have come to own a few such drives, such as a 2 GB Kingston then a 4 GB.

SanDisk. It seems not that long ago that I paid \$50 for a 128 MB Flash drive. These days you can buy a spindle of blank DVDs and get a 512 MB Flash drive for free!

Memory cards are somewhat like old removable media, in that you don't use them directly like flash drives but you must have some kind of card readers. Their most popular use is probably in cameras, but they are also used in other electronic devices, such as cell phones (SIM card), the Wii console, and the Nintendo DS. My first memory card was an 8 MB SD card, used to hold still photos in my ancient camcorder. Later, I got a real digital camera and splurged on a 128 MB CompactFlash card. These days all my cameras use 2 GB SD cards. I also have uses for microSD cards but always have to use them with adapters because they are so small.

Weaknesses: Hard to read. Does not deal with the title and main premise (scalability) immediately. Does not provide a true sense of integration throughout the chapters. If you are not a coder, you are immediately lost.





Introduction

Sometimes books are not what they appear to be Such is the case of this book. The cover and back information seemed interesting enough. Also since the author works at Yahoo! Inc. and was an engineering manager for the photo-sharing service Flickr seemed to indicate an indicate an interesting book. While those parts of the book were clear, I found that the rest of the book was not, at least for me.

I wish the book started with its introduction about scalability in the beginning (it did, but you have to look in Chapter 9 for that chapter). Perhaps I was confused about the "scalable" part of the title, maybe the title itself. While I have created websites and blogs, I have not used programmable codes much at all. So the book let me down and I felt lost (almost immediately).

I don't work with Java, Javascript, AJAX, or Perl and so I was immediately lost. While the eleven chapters seemed good, there is no sense of integration. They all do not tie together and there seems to be no integration. I had no idea how all these applications and codes actually tied together. Some chapters seemed initially comfortable but the reading and comfort ability immediately got bogged down due to the complex readings. For example, Chapter 11, API's, I thought Google Earth and Maps but there was nothing in the chapter about this at all.

Conclusion

The title and the readings are very misleading. There is little about "scable" techniques, until later in the book. The introduced or first chapter should have launched into this title immediately, clarified and talked about right away, instead of waiting for later chapters. By that the time, I found some of the information, I was completely lost and could not understand any of the prior information, let alone read most of it. In addition, certain ideas and concepts like RSS, API etc were not what I understood them to be or did not give me a better sense of what I already understood.

I just did not like how the information came through in the readings. It was too wordy and non-specific (for me). If you work on computer coding and programming, you will find various aspects of this book useful. However since I am not in that league, it is not really a book for me and my website ambitions.

Before you buy this book, look it over carefully. It might be for you, but it definitely did not have the information in the way that would help me build websites now or in the future.






Dreamweaver has been, for most part, recognized as a web developers' "tour de force", for website design. It has remained as the choice for designing websites for many years due to its lofty reputation and being the "standard" for website design. Mostly this reputation has come about due to its complex and feature laden design in one package. Dreamweaver has been a real nightmare for me however. My disdain for Dreamweaver has been a long one. Unwieldy, hard to figure out, even with the guidance of tutorials, it was highly non-intuitive and very not user friendly. In 2000, after dropping my use of Dreamweaver, I was able to produce good websites, within a week, with its new-found nemesis, GoLive. Since that time, I have watched with interest the battle between Golive and Dreamweaver, year in and year out. They have always been "neck and neck" with Dreamweaver having a few more innovations. But overall, Golive was more intuitive and a better visual tool. Still, like it or not, Dreamweaver was the "main weapon" in website building, even as both Golive and Dreamweaver became more powerful.

When Adobe took over Dreamweaver, the "writing was on the wall". Golive would soon be left for dead. My feeling was that Adobe bought Dreamweaver to use the best of Golive, meld it into Dreamweaver and gradually improve other parts of it. My feelings now are borne out by working through *Dreamweaver CS4: The Missing Manual*. My intention was to delve into its guiding principals and see if I could finally quell my disdain for Dreamweaver.

The Missing Manual book series is written by David Pogue, the New York Times Technology columnist, who continues to be the author at the helm of this series. The words on the front cover of the book say it is "the book that should have been in the box". For the most part, you can call this the main theme of this series of books. The series books are self help guidebooks for learning how to use software and hardware that usually and only comes with the meager original documentation or manuals.

This book, authored by David Sawyer McFarland, is a media and website developer since 1995. He has produced a massive but thoughtfully written guide. The fact that this author is also a writer, trainer and instructor and has taught many classes involving Dreamweaver, is borne out and is also self evident in the ways that he has thoughtfully crafted this book.

This book is more a guide then a "textbook". That is the main intent for The Missing Manual series books, as well as in this book. There are a short hand system of arrows that replaces the use of "much more text laden information". These guide the user through the learning process in a much more efficient manner. Illustrations and additional visual aids are in black and white. This is a drawback but screenshots are, for the most part, of ample size and very readable. Throughout the book, there are helpful tips, help boxes, notes along with some very nice tables (conversions for different formats. Throughout the book, there are helpful ideas in the way of tips, (called: Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), Power Users Clinic, Work around Workshop, and more), sprinkled throughout the seven parts of the 1,065-page massive book. The author helps the user cover "a lot of ground" but admirably, one can start from the beginning.



In this book, there is guidance within its 26 chapters. These are: Building web pages; Building better web pages; Bringing your pages to Life; Building a web site; Dreamweaver CS4Power; Dynamic Dreamweaver. The complexity grows with some chapters but at least there is a guidance as you progress from which ever place you start. Adobe has built a good user friendly area to learn about many facets of the Dreamweaver. This new area makes learning with this book even better and supplements the assistance of this book.

The Appendix A has an assistance help section with more information on-line which in the long run can help speed up finding more ideas and information. That combined with this book made for a much more pleasurable learning experience then when I first started with Dreamweaver. Appendix B has menu by menu descriptions for Dreamweaver CS4. Unfortunately there is just text here and no visuals and screenshots are available in this section. Finally, the huge index is well done and was very helpful.

Conclusions

I am not happy that GoLive will slowly go the way of the "Dodo bird". But I could see the "writing on the wall" when Adobe acquired Dreamweaver. My only wish was that Dreamweaver would some how become a better program and be more user-friendly for me as well as others, (should they choose to work with Dreamweaver). This wish has been fulfilled to a great extent. This book includes down to earth, basic, easy to understand tutorials. My main thought was, I "wish I had this book" when I was first starting out with Dreamweaver.

What I also like about this book are the "little things", that make reading and understanding, a more pleasurable experience. Codes, application terminology and more are outlined and explained. There is a better understanding and guidance of the information. Tutorials are well outlined in all parts of the book. By explaining, what is needed and why, applications etc are necessary, one appreciates also and learns better from this book. There are informative answers and examples which make for even greater understanding. You learn because you understand, not because "someone is teaching you and wants your to understand it". Step by step guides also provide substantial assistance, whether you use Macintosh or PC/Windows. In fact, I found that even though this software version is made for Macintosh G5 with lots of ram, I was able to workaround many aspects of Dreamweaver with my current ancient old flat panel iMac with 900 MHz! (You can download Dreamweaver for a free trial by the way).

Finally if you are a Golive or Dreamweaver user, novice to advanced, take a look at this book. While it doesn't wipe away my frustration with Dreamweaver over the years, this book and the author's way of writing this book, has given me a new outlook on this application nemesis. Hopefully one day, I can call Dreamweaver a true "friend" for website building. At least my journey has begun. Time will tell but at least with this book, I as well as others can have a good start or begin to improve and learn website building. Check it out to see if this book can meet your needs with Dreamweaver.

What I Learned

I may never have to program specifically for MS Explorer again (I never did). CSS has matured to the point that most recent browsers now play nice with it.

Whole the book relishes in the knowledge that HTML table-based layouts are essentially old-school, the book goes into how best to do tables, but this time from CSS and into how CSS3 can do a better job of layout control.

What the book does do is a fairly good job of how to deal with various browsers with work-arounds. The graphics are surrounded with lots of white space.

Conclusions

I found the book to be "light" reading. Book summary – CSS will work with MS Explorer 8 now. You still have to program for older browsers, depending on who you want to reach as your audience. The book may be "forward-looking" but how many folks are going to use MS Explorer 8 anyway? CSS has its place, but it is "no place" in older versions of MS Explorer.

I've reviewed at least the Panther and Tiger versions, and Scotts Conversion Kit Books Series. Disclosure Time—I am a Kelby fan, but I try not to let it get in the way of my reviews. But no, I don't do photography so have skipped the other well-received books on that subject in which Scott excels.

In this book... as paraphrased from the publishers write up.

"Killer Tips books are written with one goal in mind: to allow the reader to work faster and smarter. In other books, you'll often find that the most useful information is found in sidebars, tips, and notes. In a Killer Tips book, there's nothing to wade through: it's all sidebars, tips, and notes!" Scott's and Dave's offerings are comparable to the individual tips that bloggers include in their feeds, Paul Taylor detailed Hint's and Tips newsletter, or mostly introspectively useful offering s in my monthly macC tips columns.

Okay Let's Get Down to the Review — In this book, Scott Kelby gives you only the best tips, his choice is okay; I didn't notice much I cared about that was missing, but... Kelby shares info on Mac OS X Leopard in short focused FAQ-Vignette... Yes all right, okay, chill out, they're called tips. The book covers *almost* all of Leopard the new features:

- Time Machine—Apple's revolutionary and completely unique backup system;
- Spaces, which allows the user to totally customize different window configurations based on their needs;
- The flexibility and ease of use performance boosted Spotlight, which now allows the user to search across an entire network (not just the user's computer) and much more.

It's Not What You Say, Its How You Say It — Scott Kelby's Trademark style—both direct and humorous—is easily accessible to all readers, who will appreciate all the great information here, as well as the book's clear and focused presentation. As we've come to expect, bestselling author Kelby gives readers only the best tips and info on Mac OS X Leopard, covering all of the new features, in a clear and focused presentation

"If there was ever a product that richly deserved its own chapter, it's Leopard's amazing Spotlight search feature. That's because we spend a ton of our time searching for things on our Macs. Why? Because we don't know where anything is. Ever. Take my car keys, for example. You might as well take them, because I generally have no idea where they are. For some reason I can clearly remember undocumented keyboard shortcuts from Mac OS 7.1, but I have no idea where I laid my car keys last night. You know what I need? I need Spotlight outside my Mac, in my regular life. I would just type in "car keys" and it would say "in the kitchen, just to the left of the bowl of fruit" or, more likely, "they're still in the ignition." So, how does the name of this chapter, "Spotlight on Sam & Dave," fit in? Well, that's the hook from the classic oldie "Sweet Soul Music" by an artist named Arthur Conley. In the song, he "spotlights" other singers, like James Brown and Otis Redding."

Kudos and Things I Learned

General — The tips I found the most interesting, newly learned or dimly remembered will become grist of my April 2009 *Doc_Babad's Macintosh Tips column*. However, your favorites will be better suited to you need than my favorites.

UNIX is Absent-Long Live the Terminal. — None of the nitty gritty of the terminal, Unix and the like is covered in this book—No Loss! All the tips, tricks and all are easy and could, as claimed by Scott, be done by *your* mother without her asking questions or breaking into a cold sweat. Well Scott, not my mother (I'm 73) or alas even my wife for whom I provide computer services.

Spotlight May Yet be a Personally Credible Search Tool in Leopard — I've avoided spotlight like the plague, too many hits and not enough focus even when using it in Find \(\mathbb{H}\)-F window, as opposed to menu mode. Even when augmented by the shareware product, HoudahSpot. Check: [http://www.houdah.com/houdahSpot/]

Spotlight, even with a third party enhancement, was still a frustrating experience in Jaguar, Panther or Tiger. Trying to find material on my 500 GB hard drive was an occasion to take a coffee break. Reading the tips, trying a few, I'm likely to make more use of the software, particularly to boost search focus with the new Boolean tools. Perhaps Scott's enthusiasm helped a little. It's all about the OS X introduced spotlight's enhanced search ability — title as well as document contents. Too many hits, not enough control, at least until Leopard came along.



Mail and Address Book — Perhaps it's time for me to finally bite the bullet and start using Apples' address books to collect all of the contact information I have squirreled away in MSW and Acrobat Phone lists, Eudora's address book, and five or so address full FileMaker Pro databases. No, not all at once, just one at a time when I use them; of course not, {belt and suspenders} deleting them from their original sources. That would also enhance my ability to use CardIris for directly capturing scanned business cards. But switch to Mail, no never—at least until I fully check out the new version of Eudora being created. Focusing on the narrowly tuned Spotlight material in Scott's book, to focus on the useful trees than the dark forest — the other OS X related books I've reviewed for macC, did not allow me to see that light.

Jump-Starting Apple's Internet Browser — Considering how much of my computing time is spent searching the Internet for grist for my articles, books and to support my hobbies, I a very ignorant about getting the most out of my browser. I use Safari my default browser and only use Firefox when a link just @#*&%# plain refuses to open in Safari. Whether it's neglecting to use tabs; avoiding shortcuts (laziness) optimizing my use of browser windows, I'm relatively unenlightened. There's no Zen or elegance to my Safari use, I just club Safari until I get what I want; after a while. Therefore the feast of over three-dozen safari tips is almost enough to make me cry. [Think onions — aren't mixed metaphors a blast.] It's almost time to consider review a recent book on Safari much as I did in 2006 reading David Pogue and J. D. Biersdorfer' fine book The Internet-the missing manual (Pogue/O'Reilly Press.)

iTunes — Now I don't use I tunes, not at all, but I was very impress with how the book treated that otherwise useless to me subject. I know there are lots of sources for information about using iTunes, but reading the Tips set the hook — well almost — for trying out the product with my new iPod Nano, beyond transferring ripped AIFF Jazz files from my CD collection to the player.

A Few Disappointments and Discomforts

There's Better than Apple — Scott, sir, I know it's not Kosher- or politically correct in an Apple centric book, but an appendix of toys that out-Apple, Apple's tools, would be great. But you've shown a mutually shared distain for the politically correct in *The Naked Truth*. You know third party tools like HoudahSpot, EasyFind, iSeek, FruitMenu, shadowClipboard, PopChar and X-Menu are a few of my favorite tools to I augment Apple's offerings. {Readers, check them out in MacUpdate.}

Automator — Wherefore art though Automator?— Scripts are covered, but Automator is not. And of course Automator is easier then scripting. At least Ben Walden says so! Reference: Automator for Mac OS X Leopard, Peachpit Press 2008.

A Half an iLife — iWeb and iDVD got lost along the way, with no reason given that I could find.

Conclusions and Recommendation

This is, as are all the other Kelby books I've read and reviewed, a great book. Fir those who want to browse and lean more about Apple's latest and greatest Leopard OS, but want to avoid a lengthy classroom organized tutorial, this is the book to buy.

You can grab a tip or three in any areas of the Leopard OS X content that attract you, their user, and make it (them) your own. So you don't iChat, don't live most of the iLife or ignore the OS X goodies like iCal, Address Book, Preview, {Apple's} Mail or Time Machine — I don't. So skip that stuff, if you change your stubborn mind about accepting Apples bounty, it will still be there for you to learn and use.

In summary, a worthy well laid out and easy to work with book:, it's neither a tech manual nor a set of procedures, and being rife with great humor makes it even more fun to use. Buy it, you'll like it... 4.5 macCs

In all fairness one reviewer I checked out, after writing my review, was less than complementary about this book, compared to the Kelby Tips books that preceded it. I disagree but Dave deserves airtime. Dave Greenbaum, in his Technology Column noted on January 25, 2009. "With OS X, killer tips simply aren't as necessary. I've read most of this series in relation to the operating system. Each iteration of the Mac OS makes its use easier and more straightforward and thus tips aren't as important. The tips in this version are *less killer* than they were in Tiger and much less than Panther.



Introduction

I'm concerned about cutting UK emissions of twaddle – twaddle about sustainable energy. Everyone says getting off fossil fuels is important, and we're all encouraged to "make a difference," but many of the things that allegedly make a difference don't add up.

Twaddle emissions are high at the moment because people get emotional (for example about wind farms or nuclear power) and no-one talks about numbers. Or if they do mention numbers, they select them to sound big, to make an impression, and to score points in arguments, rather than to aid thoughtful discussion.

This is a straight-talking book about the numbers. The aim is to guide the reader around the claptrap to actions that really make a difference and to policies that add up.

I didn't write this book to make money. I wrote it because sustainable energy is important. What I Learned

This has got to be about the best book money can't buy (but you can anyway and I applaud David JC MacKay's incredible effort, so recommend getting a hardcopy, because it is a keeper).

David pulls no punches. He overcomes the hyperbole with facts and figures that make sense regarding "sustainable" energy. I love his use of terms like "twaddle" and "claptrap", mostly because I have read much and commented much and this book does a far, far better job than I ever could because even though the facts are basically UK-based, they pretty much "fit" the US as well, on this side of the pond.

The numbers and facts are irrefutable. I love the excellent, clear and well-thought-out graphics presentations. I think the comparisons between consumption and production in nearly every chapter arte superb, especially for those of us who seem to be a bit math-challenged.

And even the math is laid out, so even I can understand it.

The chapters even have further reading sections.

And I gladly champion the "correctness" of measuring everything as "kWh per day per person". When everything is compared with the exact same measurements, the BS factor goes out the window.

And that is what makes this book not just fun to read, but makes it a *classic* regarding sustainable energy options and their consumption vs. production factors.

The book could have been titled "Sustainable Energy for Dummies". But it really is a book for "Smarties". You read this book and you will be forever grateful men like David JC MacKay are alive and well on Planet Earth. His British humor is even contagious.

Support his efforts by buying the book. It's that simple. Cut through the blarney and BS. The wool over the eyes can now be lifted.

This year is coolest since 2000

The world in 2008 has been cooler than at any time since the turn of the century, scientists say. Cooling La Nina conditions in the Pacific brought temperatures down to levels last seen in the year 2000. The World Meteorological Organization (WMO) notes that temperatures remained about 0.3C above the 1961-1990 average. Computer models suggest that natural cycles may cool the Earth's surface in the next few years, masking the warming impact of rising greenhouse gas levels. One recent analysis suggested there might be no warming for about the next decade, though other scientists dispute the conclusion.



Sources of Rising Carbon Dioxide

Every time we get into our car, turn the key and drive somewhere, we burn gasoline, a fossil fuel

derived from crude oil. The burning of the organic materials in fossil fuels produces energy and releases carbon dioxide and other compounds into Earth's atmosphere. Greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide trap heat in our atmosphere, warming it and disturbing Earth's climate.

Scientists agree that human activities have been the primary source for the observed rise in atmospheric carbon dioxide since the beginning of the fossil fuel era in the 1860s. Eighty-five percent of all human-produced



carbon dioxide emissions come from the burning of fossil fuels like coal, natural gas and oil, including gasoline. The remainder results from the clearing of forests and other land use, as well as some industrial processes such as cement manufacturing.

The use of fossil fuels has grown rapidly, especially since the end of World War II and continues to increase exponentially. In fact, more than half of all fossil fuels ever used by humans have been consumed in just the last 20 years.

Human activities add a worldwide average of almost 1.4 metric tons of carbon per person per year to the atmosphere. Before industrialization, the concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere was about 280 parts per million. By 1958, the concentration of carbon dioxide had increased to around 315 parts per million, and by 2007, it had risen to about 383 parts per million. These increases were due almost entirely to human activity. http://www.physorg.com/news151166361.html



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Can Offshore Grids Solve Our Wind Power Woes?

As reported in Popular Mechanics, the U.S. Department of Energy says that offshore wind power could account for up to 20 percent of America's electricity generation by 2030. But while the United States scrambles to construct its first offshore wind farm, Europe has over two-dozen farms already and is considering implementing huge interconnected offshore power systems. Many of America's wind farm in the plains of the Midwest, are located far away from the grid and the power's ultimate users, coastal city dwellers.



The European Commission met last month to discuss linking all the European Union countries together in a continental supergrid. No, they're not planning to the spend millions (perhaps even billions) of Euros it would cost to install power lines across land borders. Europeans are looking offshore to connect their growing supply of offshore wind power with a grid spanning the Baltic Sea, North Sea and Mediterranean Sea. Europe is well on the way to its goal of drawing 20 percent of its total energy from renewable sources by 2020. Twenty-five offshore wind farms spread between Ireland, the U.K., Sweden, Denmark and the Netherlands already produce 1100

megawatts of power, equivalent to one nuclear reactor, and more than 20 new projects have been approved in Germany.

While winds are stronger and more consistent at sea, they're still not foolproof. If a breeze fails, a local grid can turn to other energy sources to bridge the gap. That won't work if a country draws a large proportion of its power from renewables, says Frauke Thies of Greenpeace's European Unit. Linking wind farms along the coast could solve this problem by offering some insurance against the vagaries of Mother Nature: Odds are good that, if wind stops blowing in one region, it will be windy somewhere along Europe's ample coastlines.

The \$1.9-billion high-voltage line would stretch more than 100 miles from Imperial County to San Diego, linking power plants in the desert to coastal cities hungry for their energy. Billed by its developer, San Diego Gas & Electric Co., as a superhighway for green electricity, the project has drawn fierce opposition from environmental and community groups that don't want Godzilla-sized power towers marring the region's scenic wild areas.

The bruising four-year battle has exposed one of the dirty little secrets of clean energy: A lot of this new-age power requires old-school infrastructure to get to people's homes. "You can't love renewables and hate transmission. They go together," said Jonathan Weisgall, a vice president of MidAmerican Energy Holdings Co., which owns CalEnergy.

The Carbon Cost of a Google Search Revealed

Recent research found a Google search produced a mere 7g of carbon dioxide per average search. The numbers below vary according to their source, but all are within an order of magnitude.



Two search requests on the Internet website Google, produces "as much carbon dioxide as boiling a kettle", according to a Harvard University academic. US physicist Alex Wissner-Gross claims that a typical Google search on a desktop computer produces about 7g CO2.

However, these figures were disputed by Google, who say a typical search produced only 0.2g of carbon dioxide. A recent study by American research firm Gartner suggested that IT now causes two percent of global emissions. Dr Wissner-Gross's study claims that two Google searches on a desktop computer produces 14g of CO2, which is the roughly the equivalent of boiling an electric kettle.

The Harvard academic argues that this carbon emissions stem from the electricity used by the computer terminal and by the power consumed by the large data centers operated by Google around the world.



What I Learned

This model is not the 2big Network, Dual or Triple versions that are now available.

Time Machine works.

The unit comes as Raid 0 as the default (fast) using 2 drives and uses 100% capacity as one logical volume, but stripes the data across both drives. If one goes down, you are SOL. But data gets loaded really quickly. In this default mode, data is lost on both drives, if either drive fails.

Another mode is "Big". Concatenation puts all data on one drive, then after it is filled, it starts on the next drive. Both drives are looked at as one volume. Also, 100% utilization for 2TB of space is made available, but again, no "protection".

Next up is "Safe". It is Raid 1. The drives are mirrored so only half the capacity is available. If one drive fails, the other has the data. So figure 50% or only 1 TB of capacity. LaCie recommends Raid 1. I would have thought that they would have followed their own recommendations and set that as the default, but what do I know?

The next up is the "Mix". It offers a 75% capacity or 1.5 TB of space, by splitting the drives in half and showing 2 drives on the desktop. One volume is in Safe mode (RAID 1) and the other is RAID 0. LaCie figures this gives a 75% capacity, where only 25% would be lost when/if a drive fails.

My MacBook Pro (MBP) has a 280GB of usable space on the hard drive. Doing video production is what is justifying the purchase of this unit, because I am rapidly running out of space on the MBP. Instead of "Fast", I think I'll go with "Mix" using the "don't carry all your eggs in one basket" concept.

I was told the system would be whisper quiet. Not. When the 2big feels it needs to cool down, it turns the fan up and the unit sounds like a mild DustBuster, sucking in air to cool down the drives. They could have put a filter over the outlet and the noise level would have dropped appreciably.

I put my finger in front of the 6 holes seen above the business end of the unit and the blowing sound goes away. If the vent holes had been smaller, it would have been whistling a tune.

I installed the Shortcut Button app. It is good for FireWire and USB 2.0, but not eSATA. The big blue sphere is a button. It lights. When pushed, the Shortcut Button dialogue box appears on the screen. When changing the mode, the blue light blinks red. In back, the "tool" (a large paperclip would have done the job) is used to set one of four modes. Each of the four modes blink blue when selected.

The front and back LED indicators have about 8 modes between red and blue. Blue is good. Bad, not so much. When the front is solid blue and the back has a blinking blue light, all is good with the world. When the front is strobing, the drives are spooling up. When dimming, the unit is in standby (thus the auto power switch). When alternating between blue and red, the RAID is rebuilding, depending on which mode was chosen (Safe or Mix). Alternate blinking indicates the unit needs air. If the front is red and dims down, we have a problem, Houston. If all the lights are off, the system is off or in standby mode after 30 minutes or there is an electronic board failure. I like the fact that the lights go off when the unit powers down and back when it spools back up in "Mix".

By the way, the on-off switch also has 3 modes, on, off and auto. Auto-mode is good.

I had to erase the drives, because they came as MS DOS. I had to make them "Mac Extended Journaled", once I switched from Fast to Mix. Guess what? The drives quieted down and the fan seems to be settling down too. This is good too.

Time Machine finally saw two drives and sure enough, one had half the capacity as the other. Over 1.5 million items were being backed up on the 1st partition using Time Machine. I have also been able to store other files independently on the 2nd partition. This is more than good. I like it!



The drives are 7200rpm units. My MBP has a 5400rpm unit. With FireWire 800 cables installed it will run at 800Mbits/s or 100MB/s. If I had an eSATA interface, I could transfer up to 3Gbits/s or 300MB/s. Apparently, the unit would like 600MB of free space for caching purposes on the MBP.

The Intego Backup Manager Pro provides disaster recovery. SilverKeeper Software is included for automatic backup and file verification for the Mac. With all that Murphy's Law functionality, there is also a 3-year warranty for the 2T 2big Quadra.

And all that gray ribbed surface is really a large metal heatsink. So far, it has kept its cool.

The unit weighs 5.95 pounds.

The RoSH-compliant (hazardous materials standard), 3.5-inch 1TB drives are made by Hitachi and uses "perpendicular magnetic recording (PMR) with 8.5ms read and 9.2 write times, using 5 discs and 10 heads and a 32 MB memory cache –

So far, I've been surprisingly impressed by the thought and effort LaCie has devoted to this excellent external storage device. I never, ever dreamed I could have Terabytes of storage on my desktop. It is real. Very real.

Conclusion

Yes, if you have a PC and are a shade-tree mechanic for computers, you can get large drives, gang them and roll your own for less. But they won't have a 3-year warranty and you will have to find your own backup management software. I thought the whole purpose of doing this was to reduce power use and wear and tear on equipment. Using under-utilized PCs to accomplish external storage is counter-intuitive. I don't recommend it for mission-critical processes.

Do more with less and do it in a "green" manner, with an auto-mode device like this one, so the system shuts down until it needs to be used and spools up when a backup is needed. To me, that's "green"! Gone are the days of 24/7 hard drives running all the time, wasting lots of power and reducing the life of the drive bearings.

And if you need more storage space, these units do have two Firewire 800 ports in back, so they can be daisychained, if necessary. There are also 3 TB systems that use 1.5 TB drives or if you insist, you can always go for the more expensive 4big Quadra.

Recommendations

I would not hesitate to recommend this RAID device for external storage. It nicely exceeds my current requirements for video editing purposes. I can feel good about off-loading gigabytes of files, without feeling the need to "port them to plastic" (DVDs). Don't forget the 3-year warranty.

Strengths: Well made. Very strong ability to hold up your device. Main clamp holds almost any surface it can fit around.

Weaknesses: The spring holding your device is a bit stiff. Main clamp that holds around almost anything makes it hard to occasionally clamp to anything. (Sounds strange, I know, but hear me out.)

Introduction

The product announcement of the IN YOUR FACE View Base stated it was going to be debuted at Macworld 2009. That was very unfortunate, because I wouldn't be attending, but it was something that I was very interested in. In fact, the PR piece that day wasn't real specific on what exactly an "IN YOUR FACE" was. All I knew was that it was something for the iPod Touch/iPhone and was made to make it easier to view. That's all I needed to know, as I am an iPod Touch fanatic, so I had one winging it's way towards me the day I heard about it.

Am I ever glad I was curious because it has quickly become one of my all time favorite gadgets.

Getting Started

I received the IN YOUR FACE and finally understood exactly what it entailed. To put it bluntly, it's simply a gooseneck clamp for your iPod. Perhaps you might have something like this you've already rigged up yourself, a bit similar to TEN Technology's FlexibleDock or MicFlex from MacMice . The IN YOUR FACE however, is very well thought up, very well made, and works surprisingly well!



While in the review process for IN YOUR FACE, I was tooling around their web site looking for graphics. I was drawn to a statement that noted, "IN YOUR FACE, LLC was a start-up company founded in July 2008 by husband and wife team Hans and Marion Kohte. Initially the idea of a hands free iPhone holder was born to remedy a pair of sore arms after watching a two hour movie in the passenger seat during a 12 hour car trip."

To me, that was fascinating. Usually, when you ask a developer about a certain piece of shareware, they often reply that it was born out of

necessity. They lament about wanting their computer to do something specific. Not finding anything on the market that met their needs, they created it themselves. I've never heard of a gadget that someone has not only made, but actually taken to market. The curiosity got the best of me, and I got a hold of Marion Kohte to find out the story on IN YOUR FACE.

A bit of history behind the product.

I've always looked at a product from Belkin, iHome or even Apple to have been made by some sort of committee. A bunch of corporate types sitting around a large oval oak table coming up with the next best gadget. It never occurred to me that it could actually have been made by someone, a la ABC's American Inventor show, or something like it.

The idea was born from Hans Kohte's car trip from Utah to San Francisco, and from having to hold his iPod Touch up to his face to watch movies. Well, we've all been there. Whether it be holding your device in an automobile, or trying prop it on an aircrafts seat tray while trying to eat your little box meal, it can be trying to do any of this one-handed, not to mention very trying on the arms.

True to the Apple spirit of invention, a "Garage" was used to begin the process of inventing what would become the IN YOUR FACE Viewbase. Speaking of



American Inventor, they even consulted a product designer that had worked with the show in Santa Monica. Now they were getting serious.

After many different variations, they finally came up with what would be the final product. This is where I believe many people fail. Marion stated that quality was the deciding direction that was taken. They were constantly being asked to make design modifications. The couple dug in their heels, refusing to deviate from how they wanted the product to function. Having put in their own funds to take IN YOUR FACE to market, they did not want to compromise on any of their ideas.

Wanting to stay true to their design form and not considering selling the design to a larger company, they decided to take IN YOUR FACE to market themselves. With their gathered resources, they booked a booth at Macworld and finally found a manufacturer in China that would manufacture what they specified. They threw all in and ordered 5,000 units.

It must have been a nightmare for them. Here Macworld was finally arriving, a mere couple of days away and still no word from the manufacturer. Yet, in true movie fashion, literally hours before the beginning of the show, the first shipment arrived. The rest, as they say, is history!

Now how cool is that? A true underdog tale straight out of Hollywood. It's something that I don't think I've ever contemplated when looking at the shelves of a local dealer. So now when you look at the IN YOUR FACE, you can think about a real-life couple and their son just wanting a piece of the pie.

Now on to what I think



As you might have surmised by now, I think the IN YOUR FACE is a great product. Yes, it's nothing more than a clamp for your devices. I say devices, because it can hold more than just your iPod Touch or iPhone. The holding clamp can expand to approximately 2 3/4 inches, so even your PSP can fit.

The spring holding your device is a bit stiff. It's pretty tough if you try to remove your iPhone with one hand. I measured it around 8 pounds of force needed to move the jaws out. It is nicely padded, though, so at least your precious won't

get scratched or damaged. The plus side of the stiffness is that whatever you decide to hold, it's not going to let go and let anything drop to the ground. The device holder is attached to the main neck by clamping over a ball-end on the neck, allowing full movement of the head.

The main clamp is, well, it's got both good and bad points. On the good point, the main spring looks heavy duty. It also seems about half the stiffness of the other spring, but that may be just the physics of it. The clamps are padded to prevent damage to the desk, table, computer, whatever you decide to put it on. The lower clamp is hinged in the middle, allowing the clamp to fit around most anything you want it too.



That's the plus and the minus of the entire setup. You can clamp around a non-flat surface, such as an armrest or a pole, even. However, I've found that you need to be able to have around an inch of surface to grab sufficiently. For example, if your desk has a lip around it that is under an inch, and that is where you want to clamp it, it's not going to be sufficient to grab onto and hold your device at any angle you want it. It does have a full 2" opening, allowing it to clamp around most anything. Occasionally you might have problems if it is clamped around something vertical and have the neck extended. If the surface is slick it may start to slide, especially if it's in a moving vehicle. Otherwise, it works fairly well.



The neck is very sturdy, and doesn't allow much movement of your device when on the move. It's made of a soft aluminum rod that is covered in a rubber or thick powder-coating. (Can't remember if the electrical properties or more specific, the curing temps of aluminum will allow powder-coating or not.) The question about the metal getting fatigued and possibly breaking is there, but I'm not worried. I have a magnet on the end of a long thick aluminum rod like this and I am constantly winding it up and unwinding it. It's never had any hint of metal fatigue in it, and it's at least 10 years old. The neck isn't too soft, however. It can hold almost 2 pounds before

bending.

Recommendation



All—in—all, I think it's a wonderful gadget. It almost makes up for not being able to attend Macworld! OK. Not really, but it really is a great consolation prize. I have it clamped on my desk right now, allowing constant access to my iPod. It also goes around my headboard giving me my own alarm clock. I used it for a trip last week and it worked as advertised.

I wouldn't hesitate in recommending the IN YOUR FACE to anyone using and iPhone or iPod Touch. It constantly comes in handy wherever I am. On any kind of trips, it's almost a necessity. I

was thinking of ordering one or two extra, so I wasn't carrying this one back and forth.

The incredible usefulness, plus the history that I now know about it, makes it a given for ownership alongside the power cable itself!

It was not all that long ago that thumb drives cost a LOT more money for a lot LESS memory.

These units are die-cast metal with the little coin-like edges to help grip in order to spin the drive

open to reveal the USB interface.

Conclusion

Toss me that coin before it increases in value!

Disclaimer: When briefly reviewing share-freeware I will often use the developer's product, functions and features descriptions. All other comments are strictly my own and based on testing. Why need I rewrite the developer's narratives, if they are clearly written?

Introduction Including Publisher's Summary

The reason that I'm reviewing this excellent product, now, in February, needs sharing. Last month, I gave a demonstration of Acrobat 9 Pro to our local Mid-Columbia Macintosh Users group on editing and reformatting, annotating and otherwise changing, downloaded recipes with Acrobat Pro. Since both Acrobat and Acrobat pro, having a broader set of features aimed at corporate users, than the recipe-editing task requires, I needed to check out an alternative to the more expensive Adobe products. [You patient reader are all aware of my interest in both cooking, cooking software and recipe collecting.] I had previously reviewed PDF Pro in an earlier version (2.1, in June 2005, 4.0 macCs) but the need for a second look at the software became a priority.

In response to a question from club members, I promised to determine whether for the editing methods I demonstrated, PDFpen or pro made more cost effective sense that Acrobat Standard {no longer available for the Macintosh} or Pro. {\$450 (Adobe}, \$405 {Amazon} and \$150 {Academic.)

I'm licensed and am comfortable with both PDFpen Pro and Acrobat Pro 9, however I do not come close to utilizing all of its features. In this review, I'll provide a quick overview of PDF pen's overall features, and as an appendix to this review provide a comparison chart of the features of various competing products.

However, the main focus will be on working with, on the web page and editing downloaded PDF formatted web recipes. This is a topic, which in part, I've dealt with previously in macCompanion.

PDFpen's rich features

Disclaimer: Nothing in this review should be deemed as a negative commentary on Acrobat and Pro. I use and continue to use that product in association with my consulting practice, working with government agencies and companies. However, the Adobe product is more powerful than may of us need. Indeed in my macC review I suggested that the developer create the equivalent of its fine Photoshop Elements, perhaps to be called Acrobat Elements. Wait no longer PDFpen & Pro are here!

Using the Software

As a first test, more an overview than an in-depth probe, I tested most of the feature of a PDF manipulation features important to me on various technical documents. It took a while for me to catch on to how to effectively use this product. I had help both from the help files on the SOMM website and more specifically for the information in the Getting Started with PDFpen guide a part of SOMM's reviewer's guide.

This did however, not prepare me for the challenges I faced in the more complex task of recipe reformatting. Fortunately for both my piece of mind and the ability to fairly evaluate this product, I got valuable and responsive help from Phillip Goward, CEO and Lead Developer of SOMM Why, I initially did not understood enough about the products interface, as oppose to Acrobat's, to use it effectively. This despite my initial overview of the product. My problems were NOT with PDFpen. They were due almost entirely to the fact that when I start to manipulate a PDF document, I expect to be able to work with it using the tools and techniques I leaned over years of Acrobat use. [I don't even have reader installed on my computer.] I know it's an oxymoron but PDFpen is not Acrobat. It's my new mantra, this despite the fact that it would easily serve as an Acrobat *Light* or *Elements*


My detailed testing was focused on editing two recipes I downloaded from the Taste of Australia website. A summary my editing goals:

Reduce number of pages by consolidating needed/wanted information by

- Moving images from left justified to the right to allow txt to be moved closer to the top of the page to gain left side space.
- Delete unneeded text including sidebar items, reader comments and blogger boilerplate.
- Shrinking images both to gain space or to accommodate shifting text to either the right or left hand side of the smaller image.
- Add a Googled image if needed.
- Add personal adlibs or make recipe changes associated with my personalizing the recipe.
- Remove unneeded time stamps and correct the page numbers that resulted from my reducing the recipe page count.

My Results

You can check out the original version of Chinese Beef w Sweet Orange Sauce at: http://www.taste.com.au/recipes/13972/chinese+beef+with+sweet+orange+sauce Prior to printing the recipe to PDF, I enlarged the text one size using Safari's *make text bigger tool* [#-+].



Okay, what are you really looking at? — Overall, there are only minor differences formatting between the two documents. Part of this is due to the fact that I made slight changes to specific text-image placement between working with the Acrobat version a few weeks ago and graduating to PDFpen yesterday.

In other recipe transformations, a few of the limitations I listed, below, as discomforts appeared. Those in large part focused on problems I had in attempting to *Condense Text*. Phil Goward shared a work around but I was running late so didn't further experiment. After all, I got exactly what I needed using PDFpen, in a third of the time, ignoring learning curves, than doing the editing in Acrobat Pro. Not bad... at about 10% of the price, I could get three times the work done. *Ups*, I also switched googled images, I like the newly found one better.

And yes, the documents manipulated in PDFpen are all Acrobat compatible and will working in a corporate environment. No there are a few discomforts, see below, I had with the product's limitations, all of which have been recognized by the developer and are potential grist for the next upgrade.

Discomforts

PDFpen to JPG or TIFF — I could not find, unlike in Acrobat, to export a document to either a TIFF or JPG so it could be used to illustrate an article. Several alternate work arounds solved the problem. Dragging a PDFpen file into a blank MS Word document concerted the file to an image. Copying the image into GraphicConverter, gave me a JPG file I could use. {I know, I could have dragged the PDFpen file directly into my review; isn't 20-20 hindsight wonderful. Phil Goward suggested I convert the PDF file by *Printing t Preview* and saving the resulting document as a JPG file—slick.

Condensing Text — In Acrobat it is easy to change the spacing of lines of text, to achieve a bit of space during document reformatting.

Clearing Active Links. — Many of my PDF's contain links that are invisibly locked in place and moving test leaves the link indicator in place, with no easy way to remove their residues with PDFpen.

I Miss Using Arrow Keys — I miss being tweak editable text with the arrow keys, not a biog deal, but old habits die hard. Their use in PDFpen is lore limited than I'm used to.



Conclusions and Recommendations

Since most conclusions are too lengthy, let's try a 2¢ plain for a change.

This is an excellent product whose feature set will serve most users well. I conceive it to be the Acrobat *Elements* or Acrobat *Lite* for the rest of us.

Although not yet perfect, the discomforts I encountered did not effect my reaching my reformatting deign goals.

Part of the macC reviewer guidelines asks, "What you'd suggest a friend consider before spending hard-earned cash." My unequivalent answer is yes! The product, I'm a stingy grader; is clearly worth 4.5 macCs.

Bottom Line: All of the tools I needed are available in both applications. Naming connections are different as are their location in either the tool-bar or under menu bar headers. The scopes of an item's actions are also different, but over-all what you need for editing PDF formatted recipes is available at a mouse click. It's all a mater of what you get used to... the practice thing music teachers nag you about.
